

Reflection by Fr Aleki Piula



I give you a new commandment: love one another as I have loved you

Today's readings are about renewal and new things like the new Jerusalem, a new Heaven and a new earth, and a new commandment. The three readings of today's liturgy have one theme in common: suffering is temporal, and the glory is eternal. Paul and Barnabas put new heart into the disciples with the message that we must experience many hardships before we enter the kingdom of God. Then the writer of the Apocalypse, after all the persecutions and tribulations of earlier chapters, describes his vision of the new Jerusalem, where God lives among people. In the extract from John's gospel, immediately after Judas had gone out, as the passion was about to commence, Jesus spoke of his glorification. He speaks of going away but he leaves a new commandment: 'Love one another; just as I have loved you, you also must love one another'. In our today's Gospel we hear Jesus said: 'Love one another as I have loved you'. Of all the commandments Christ gave us this is the most important. It includes all the others. The only failure in the life of a Christian is the failure to love. Let us think about the people whom we find difficult to take into our hearts and ask the Lord to help us to be more loving towards them.

In the first reading from the Acts of the Apostles, they assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them. Paul and Barnabas retrace their steps, encouraging the little communities of Christians they had founded. This reading tells us about the conclusion of the first missionary journey of Paul and Barnabas, they are encouraging these little communities which they founded and prepared them for the persecutions which would inevitably come. By their presence, they are proclaiming the great works of God in the past and in the present.

Psalm 145 sings, 'I will bless your name for ever, O God my King'. This psalm is about the community of Love. In the responsorial psalm we can find some of the qualities of Christian love. The Lord is kind and full of compassion. The grace of the Lord's presence in the apostolic community was manifest in their pooling of resources and care for the poor. Slow to anger and abounding in love. Christian love will outlast any persecution and outlive all suffering 'Yours is an everlasting kingdom; your rule lasts from age to age.

In the second reading from the book of Revelation is taken from the final part of Apocalypse, this opens with the vision of a new world and the new order of things inaugurated by Christ. This reading describes how God renews His Church, the New Jerusalem, by being present in her members, in their communities and in their liturgical celebrations, 'See I am making all things new'. The New Covenant is accomplished in a community, 'they shall be his people, and he will be their God'. The New Jerusalem is a vision of the renewed and final relationship between man and God, a relationship that has been prepared in the life of Israel and the Church'.

In today's Gospel during the Last Supper Jesus gives his apostles a new commandment, to love one another as he has loved them. In the scene of the Last Supper, Judas had departed and Jesus alone with his own. Jesus is going forward to the cross. By so doing, he is giving glory to God, who in turn will give glory to him. The apostles can't follow him yet. In the meantime, they are to live by a 'new commandment', the commandment of love. It is new only in the sense that it sets a new standard, 'as I have loved you'. The world will know that they are his disciples by their fidelity to this commandment. So, today's gospel gives us the secret of Christian renewal as the faithful practice of Jesus' new commandment: 'Love one another as I have loved you' (John 13:35).

Here Jesus adds up a new element to the Old Testament command of love by teaching us that the true test of discipleship is to love other people in the same way that he has loved us, with sacrificial, selfless, self-giving, unconditional agape love. The meaning of the renewal of Christian life is a radical change of vision and a reordering of our priorities in life. And a renewal brings us to embrace new attitudes, new values and new standards of relating to God, to other people and indeed, to our whole environment. In John's theology, the new life of heaven begins in community of love on earth.

I was pleased to see four children at the meeting last Sunday. The classes are now up and running and I am hopeful that we will see all of the group who began the class last year wanting to complete the preparation for the Sacraments of Reconciliation, Confirmation and First Holy Communion. As Cardinal Newman put it: 'Grace in this life is glory in exile and glory is grace at home'. The only mark that Jesus gives to his disciples make them different when they practice of love. 'I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another. This is how all will know that you are my disciples if you have love for one another' (John 13:34-35). So, the heart of all this and what holds all things together is the commandment of love: Love of God and love of neighbour; love as Jesus loved us. Without love, all things fall apart. Hence, their practice of love led the Apostles and the disciples to the rapid spread of Christianity. Have a blessed Sunday.

The second part of the synodal process was to respond to the question

What steps does the Spirit invite us to take to grow in our "journeying together"?

In other words what could be improved?

Responses concerning our parish, included:

Open communication is essential. Information must be shared. All should be informed about what is happening. The sick should be cared for, and not just ignored by keeping quiet about them, so that the whole community knows whom to pray for. All should be informed about the Sacramental programmes, so people prepare well for them, and participants can be prayed for, and welcomed into the community. Sharing is important, and hence the PPC needs to connect with the people.

Baptisms and weddings must be announced in Mass, so people can know and pray for them. Our willingness to come, care and pray is led by the Holy Spirit.

When a Parish Priest changes, the views of the next Priest also change.

We should have Bible study along with the knowledge of Theology, and we must know and realise the connection.

The Gospel with the reflection is a must for us as a community/ Parish.

And drawing on our own experience in this parish the following is recommended:


- That significant education be given to all sectors of the Catholic Community, in terms of the requirements to recognise and practice a 'BI-CULTURAL' way of operating within our faith communities; and developing and valuing these practices and opening up to also becoming a vital and active MULTICULTURAL Catholic Community.
- That the Church in New Zealand's priestly leadership show courage to address the 'consigning of women and other marginalised groups' to full participation in the true and full decision making; and the leadership of all levels of this Community of Faith.
